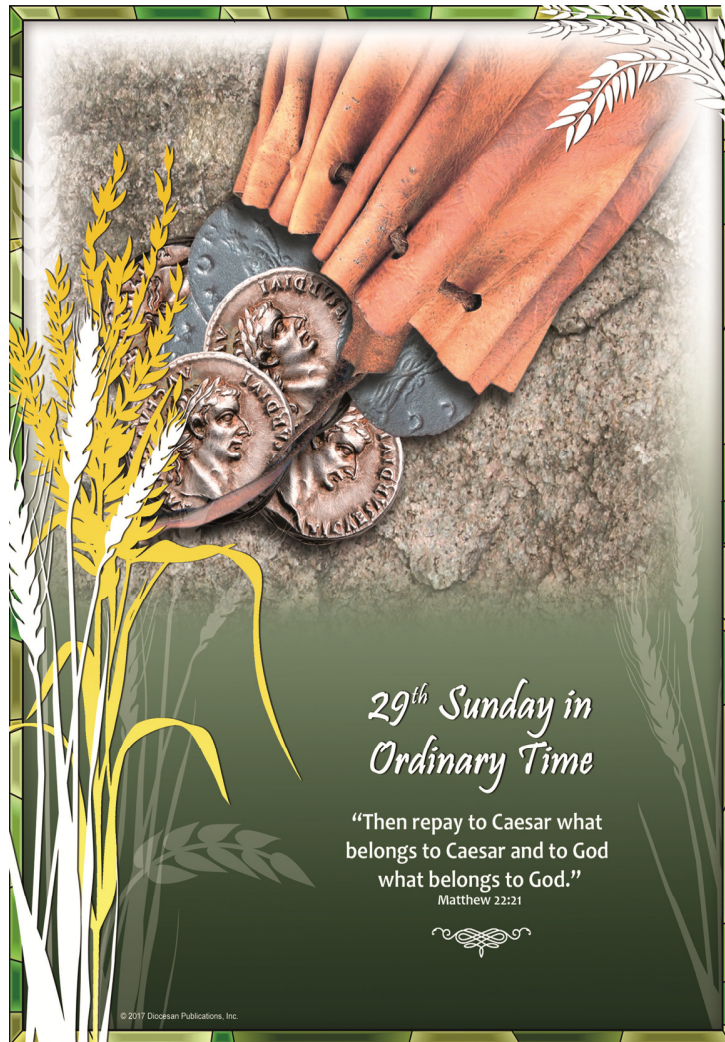

## Information About Reception of the Sacraments

The seven Sacraments of the Church were instituted by Christ to confer grace.

**Sacrament of Baptism.** Call the parish office to register for the parents' pre-Baptismal instruction. For adults seeking to enter the Church and be Baptized, contact our Religious Ed. Office.

**Sacrament of Penance (Confession).** Children in our religious education program and school are prepared for Confession at age seven, as part of First Communion preparation.

**Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist.** Children in our religious education program and school are prepared for First Communion at age seven. Adults seeking First Communion should contact our Religious Ed. Office

**Sacrament of Confirmation.** Young people in our parish are prepared for reception of Confirmation in the ninth grade (age 14). For adults seeking Confirmation contact our Religious Ed. Office.

**Sacrament of Marriage.** Couples planning for Marriage are to contact a parish priest or deacon one year in advance to set the wedding date and plan for pre-Cana instruction.

**Sacrament of Holy Orders.** If you believe you have, or someone you know has, a vocation to the Priesthood or Diaconate, please contact one of our parish priests.

**Anointing of the Sick.** For the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick (sometimes called "Last Rites") administered by a Priest, a person or immediate family member must make the request. Late night requests may not be able to be answered until the next day. For a visitation to the sick, or Holy Communion to the sick, contact our parish office.

Dear Parishioners,

In 1978, the New Wave singer, Elvis Costello recorded a song written several years earlier entitled “What’s so Funny ‘bout Peace, Love and Understanding.” This song would find a wider audience in 1993, when it was rerecorded in by Jazz vocalist Carl Stiger, and included in the Whitney Houston flick, “*The Bodyguard*.” *This song’s very reflective, and ponderous lyrics start out like this: “As I walk through / this wicked world / searchin’ for light in the darkness of insanity. / I ask myself / Is all hope lost? / Is there only pain and hatred, and misery? / And each time I feel like this inside / There’s one thing I wanna know: / What’s so funny ‘bout peace love and understanding?”*

**Peace, Love and Understanding?** To look at the events in our world today, and saying that our world is seeking peace, love and understanding, might indeed evoke a laugh at the funniness of the claim. But nonetheless, God is love, peace and understanding – or as we more commonly express it: Father (who is love), Son (who is the Prince of Peace) and the Holy Spirit (who bestows understanding). And we, as a people and as a world, seek God. So, it proper to say, that, however imperfectly we do it, we are seeking peace, love and understanding; whether we realize it or not, that is our goal in life.

**R-e-s-p-e-c-t.** October is Respect Life Month: a month dedicated to the truth that mankind is God’s special creation, created to rule over the rest of creation, and whose very being – personhood – is a gift given freely by God, and to be protected, with reverence and care, by us. When mankind protects human life, in common cause, we are de facto preserving peace, love and understanding. However, in our world today, much like a fizgig promising devotion and faithfulness, the culture of death allures us away from our commitment to life with false promises and misguided understandings of the preciousness of life.

**Back in the Day.** The most egregious of man’s crimes against his fellow man, and indeed against peace, love and understanding, is the pernicious crime of abortion. Abortion is a blot on our modern world, like no other. Some folks will counter that abortion has always gone on and is not merely a product of the modern world; and that is true. However, in nearly every civilized society in the world, from mankind’s early history to the mid-20th Century, abortion was crime. Just like there has always been theft, rape, fraud, and murder, yes, there has always been a presence of abortion, but like theft, rape, fraud, and murder, abortion was not acceptable – and was a crime. As a matter of fact, societies that didn’t respect life, like the Aztecs (who killed crying babies so that their tears would induce the gods to provide rain) and the Spartans (who put to death children deemed too weak or imperfect), fizzled away like a waning Fourth of July sparkler in the rain.

**A Wrong Right.** And so, it was, for centuries upon centuries, universally understood that the idea of taking the life of child in the womb was a crime against God and man. Then, in these

United States (and in many parts of the western world), in the turbulent 60s, a movement came a foot to, at first, decriminalize abortion, and then legalize it. In 1973, the United States Supreme Court, in perhaps the worst decision in all of America’s jurisprudential history, not only legalized abortion, but took the exceptional leap of making it a constitutional right. A body blow to peace, love and understanding if ever there was one.

**More than Numbers.** Since 1973, in the United States, some 60,000,000 abortions have been performed. To put this in context, that represents more than the population of more than half the states in our nation; more than Alabama, Alaska, Arkansas, Connecticut, Delaware, Hawaii, Idaho, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maine, Mississippi, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New Hampshire, New Mexico, North Dakota, Oklahoma, Oregon, Rhode Island, South Dakota, Utah, Vermont, West Virginia, and Wyoming, combined. Worldwide, the number stands at 1,472,000,000, since 1980. These numbers can sometimes be looked upon as mere statistical abstracts, but they are not. Each number is a human life that has gone unborn. Each number is a life snuffed out from a concern for finances, shames, fear or loss of freedom.

**False Premises, False Promises.** During this Respect Life Month, let us recommit ourselves to respect the innate value of human life, from the moment of conception to the moment of natural death. Let us turn back the darkness of the culture of death, and never, never, never, accept its false premises (to take a child’s life is your choice) and its false promises (you will be better off without this child).

**Words...** St. Teresa of Calcutta said it well: “[I]f we accept that a mother can kill even her own child, how can we tell other people not to kill one another?” She added, “Any country that accepts abortion is not teaching its people to love one another, but to use any violence to get what they want... This is why the greatest destroyer of love and peace is abortion.” Scripture says it more succinctly, “You shall not kill.”

**... and Music.** To finish as I started, I want to again reference the song, “What’s so Funny ‘bout Peace, Love and Understanding.” That song finishes with these word: “*And as I walk on / through troubled times / my spirit gets so downhearted sometimes. / So where are the strong / and who are the trusted? / And where is the harmony? / Sweet harmony. / Because each time I feel it slipping away, just makes me want to cry: / ‘What’s so funny ‘bout peace love and understanding?’*” To answer that question: There is nothing funny about it at all; it is what is needed if we are to survive. Living our Catholic faith and turning hearts and minds around on the issue of abortion (as we have been doing for nearly a half century), as well as changing laws and society, will go a long way to bring peace, love and understanding in our lives and in our nation.

## SCHOOL UPDATE

It was last summer, and after nearly thirty years of marriage my husband and I were planning a vacation. Vacations were not something we ever arranged; we would take the occasional day trip here and there, but to actually make a plan, buy the tickets, and fly off somewhere was a foreign concept. Last summer was the exception, and so it was on a glorious sunny afternoon that we flew out of BWI bound for Seattle WA. Awaiting takeoff we admitted to one another our nervous excitement over our upcoming adventures.

Flash forward a few months later when our entire fifth grade accompanied by our sixth grade chorus members ventured to Lancaster, PA for the presentation of Jonah at the Sight and Sound Theater. Awaiting the arrival of the buses at the end of the day, I joined the gathering of parents outdoors. There was a gentleman I did not recognize and so I went over to introduce myself. I learned that he was dad to one of our fifth graders. He went on to tell me that he lived in Seattle, WA and was in Delaware for a short stay. Oh! Seattle, WA?? I seized the opportunity to relate some of our adventures of this past summer. I began by telling him how I was completely blown away by the Amazon Biospheres, (Enormous spheres with a height of 29 metres and a diameter as wide as 40 metres, the bubble-like structures are designed to provide Amazon's employees with stimulating spaces for work, and relaxation. They contain a mix of 300 plants from around the globe that will eventually be planted across five floors, where there is enough space to accommodate mature trees. The architecture, not to mention the precision and complexity of the mathematical calculations behind the design of these beautiful gigantic spheres was mind-boggling to me. These spheres are situated in between two Amazon buildings adorned with gorgeous, colorful facades giving off the effect of technicolor glass. When I expressed my excitement over my visit to this Seattle landmark to my new acquaintance, his response was a rather dispassionate "Oh, yeah." Well, not to be completely deflated, I proceeded to tell him that we had also seized the opportunity to scale 5000 feet along some pretty tricky trails up Mt. Rainier. Once again, failing to impress him by my truly stepping out of the box experience, my new friend simply, but politely responded by saying "Oh yeah, everybody does that when they visit." What!? I was throwing snowballs off the side of an active volcano, the highest peak in the northwest in JULY!

Well, with that the buses lumbered their way around the corner and we parted company to go and greet the travelers. Speaking of being blown away...that was the overall consensus of the passengers as they disembarked the bus. "Mrs. Pollitt, it felt like we were underwater, I had jelly fish sweep past my right eye!" It was a splendid opportunity for our students. The realism quite matches my experience at the Seattle spheres.

So what does all this have to do with Catholic education? Good question! Let's talk about the passion for a sound Catholic identity. Let's talk about a passion for Catholic education. Let's talk about passion, and its antithesis. Last Friday our school gathered in the church to pray the Joyful Mysteries of the Rosary. Our fourth graders have been practicing since September. Many of their parents joined us in our prayer. The opportunity to assemble for prayer is a privilege we take for granted. Let us not allow our prayers to become so rote that they lack passion. There is much to pray for in this day and time. When you tell someone that we prayed the Rosary in school the other day, pray that their response isn't "Oh yeah?" When you share that your child attends a Catholic school, pray you don't meet with indifference. When I thanked our parents for choosing a Catholic education for their children, I told them that there is nothing more wholly beautiful, more wholly innocent, or more wholly perfect than the prayer of a child. I could easily interchange "Holy" for its homonym. At Holy Cross we are passionate about Catholic education; we are passionate about our Catholic identity. Thank you for partnering with us as we instill this in our students.
