Information About Reception of the Sacraments

The seven Sacraments of the Church were instituted by Christ to confer grace.

Sacrament of Baptism. Call the parish office to register for the parents' pre-Baptismal instruction. For adults seeking to enter the Church and be Baptized, contact our Religious Ed. Office.

Sacrament of Penance (Confession). Children in our religious education program and school are prepared for Confession at age seven, as part of First Communion preparation.

Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist. Children in our religious education program and school are prepared for First Communion at age seven. Adults seeking First Communion should contact our Religious Ed. Office

Sacrament of Confirmation. Young people in our parish are prepared for reception of Confirmation in the ninth grade (age 14). For adults seeking Confirmation contact our Religious Ed. Office.

Sacrament of Marriage. Couples planning for Marriage are to contact a parish priest or deacon one year in advance to set the wedding date and plan for pre-Cana instruction.

Sacrament of Holy Orders. If you believe you have, or someone you know has, a vocation to the Priesthood or Diaconate, please contact one of our parish priests.

Anointing of the Sick. For the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick (sometimes called "Last Rites") administered by a Priest, a person or immediate family member must make the request. Late night requests may not be able to be answered until the next day. For a visitation to the sick, or Holy Communion to the sick, contact our parish office.

The name of the month "January" comes from the name Roman god Janus. Janus had two faces: one face looking to the past and the other looking to the future. As we enter the new year of 2018, it is indeed a good time to prayerfully look back at the year that has just ended and to look with hope to the new year ahead of us. John Lennon in his 1971 hit, "Happy Christmas," said it well: "And so this is Christmas, and what have we done, another year over, and new one just begun."

What Have We Done? And so, at this time of year, we ask ourselves "and what have we done?" We ask ourselves a battery of questions about the year that just passed. We look back, hopefully not just to lament or just to celebrate, but rather to use that time of retrospection to determine how we can do better, what we need to change and how to move forward in the coming year.

To Thine Own Self. A review of the past year helps us to set goals and resolutions for the new year. But for us we perhaps often fall into the way of our culture by making mere wishes rather than making real and honest resolutions. The culture tells us that you can do and be anything you want; that sounds nice and uplifting, but it is not true. We have to be honest with ourselves and know our own limitations. One can wish and wish, but a blind man will not become a baseball umpire; a paraplegic will not become a tap dancer; Lucy may wish to get into Ricky's show on every episode of "I Love Lucy," but it is not in the cards; and I may want to be the center on the Philadelphia 76ers, but that is not going to happen. As the old saying goes, "If wishes were horses, beggars would ride!"

Of Wishcraft and Genies. So, for us, resolutions cannot be fantastical wishes that some genie will magically grant. No, for us resolutions must be real improvements: they identify things we should be doing but are not doing. They are changes we need to make and can make in our own life, by examining ways to overcome obstacles in our path that may keep us from the right path; the path to which Christ beckons us.

Climb Every Mountain. I am reminded of the song "Up Where We Belong" from the movie "An Officer and a Gentlemen" – one of the lines in that songs noted, "There are mountains in our way, but we climb a step every day." Resolutions are ways to make those steps and to climb those mountains in our life. In making

those steps, Jesus Christ, our Lord and our God, is both our guide and our companion, and the one who can make our climb successful. Our faith in Christ and his Church is what allows us to move forward and move mountains! It is our resolutions this year and every year that should move us to put that faith in to action and allow the Lord to lead us forward.

Plan B? But what if we don't do that? What if we don't want to resolve to improve ourselves and move forward with Christ? Well, the alternative shuns resolutions and instead substitutes wishes. The alternative to moving forward is to simply spend your life looking back, and just wishing things were different. Or look at others and lamenting what they have and you don't and wishing for it to be otherwise. No plan, just disembodied wishes, and lament.

Same Old, same old? I am reminded of a song played on the radio during this time of year, by singer Dan Fogelberg, called "The Same Old Lang Syne." In that song, the singer spends his time looking back on an old relationship rather than looking forward. One Christmas Eve, the snow was falling beautifully, and he meets his old girlfriend. Amidst the beauty of the snow, the two people talk about old times, they reminisce, and they do all of those things we do when catching up with old friends. And as the snow continue to fall, they shared a beer in her car and talked and talked. And the singer then wishes, wishes, wishes that perhaps they could get back together and relive their former ways of life, their glory days, even though she is now married. But then, reality sets in, and the real world comes down on him like an anvil. And the two of them part ways – and she drives away. The singer then laments, "*And as I turned to make my way back home, the snow turned into rain.*"

A Lot of Salt. This is what can happen to us when we tie ourselves to this world and are always looking backwards and not ahead. When we lament what others have that we don't. When we lament what was left behind. When we lament what could have been. There's nothing wrong with remembering, because it is the past that can help us with the present and the future. But we cannot languish there. That's what happened to Lot's wife. In the Book of Genesis, as Abraham and others looked ahead to the promised land, she looked back, and wound up frozen as a pillar of salt unable to ever look forward. I would commend any of you who are of this mindset, lament all you want, but life doesn't have an undo button – we must look forward. We can remember yesterday, but our eyes must be on tomorrow.

It is only when we look ahead to the promises of our Lord, to the hope of heaven, to the joys of faith, that we shall we be able to realize our New Year's Resolution of a new and strengthened life in union with God and his Holy Church... a Church that was born of his Son, who was born of his mother Mary, who pondered all of these things in her heart, and cooperated with God's grace to the fullest.

And so, let our resolution for this new year, and for every year to come, be this: To follow the example of Mary, the Mother of God, who trusted in the Lord, and who didn't fear the future, as she said, "*Let it be unto me according to the thy word.*" Those ten little words are the ingredients of one big happy year ahead for us all in 2018. Mary, Mother of God, pray for us!

SCHOOL UPDATE

This is another installment in a very occasional series where a HC student is showcased for extraordinary accomplishments AFTER the dismissal bell rings.

It's 11:30 in the morning and I hear the inner office door close. It's 11:30. I know it's Kendall. With her backpack securely affixed, and her lunch bag in hand, Kendall is preparing to go out with her classmates for recess. Why the need for her backpack? Well, you see...Kendall's school day has ended. She will then bound out the door, running at top speed down the pavement for about 12 minutes of recess before her mom or dad sign her out for the day. Kendall's school day is a little different from that of her peers.

It was early August when I first received the phone call from her dad. He wanted to ask a favor of Holy Cross. After playing one of the longest games of phone tag I've ever been involved in, we all finally had the chance to sit down and discuss a very prestigious invitation presented to Kendall. Her gymnastics club had spoken with Kendall's dad informing him that her coaches had identified her as a gymnast with great talent. They would love to have her on their travel team representing the club during competition. In addition, they would like her to have extra time to develop her gift in preparation for ...who knows???? Maybe Olympic competition?? Well, I was just as excited as they were! What do we have to do to make this happen for Kendall?? Thanks to Mrs. Boyles, Mrs. Speed and her Enrichment teachers for working with Kendall and her family, she is able to compete at a higher level and devote a healthy number of extra hours towards a sparkling bright future in gymnastics.

Kendall is an honor roll student who works very hard to make everything work in her very demanding schedule. She has had Math, Reading, English and Science before leaving for the day. Eating her lunch and working on school assignments during her hour long drive is no more than routine. Upon her arrival she suits up and hits the floor to limber up her joints before her five hours of intense coaching begins. Kendall competes in four difference events. Typically the routines are about 60-70 seconds in duration and are designed by her coach. Her favorite event is Floor which requires her to incorporate some ballet along with rolling herself all over the mat (tumbling) and tossing her approximately 4 foot body in the air (jumping). However, she is also becoming an expert in the parallel bars, balance beam, and the vault as well. As an avid spectator of Olympic gymnastics over the years, I positively marvel at the way the human body can be made to mirror that of a rubber band.

Tossing the gym bag (and backpack) in the back of the car early on any Saturday morning, you might find Kendall and her parents traveling to our nation's capital, Atlantic City, or Virginia Beach for competition. Competing in all four events, Kendall has been recognized for her accomplished routines and takes pride in the medals and trophies she has been awarded. Once the taxing and challenging day is complete, Kendall dives into the backpack and tries to get some school work done. It all just begs the question....*when does this little girl sleep?*

Commitment and sacrifice are not easy. To walk a day in Kendall's shoes would be daunting for many. With the support of her devoted family, her Holy Cross teachers, and gymnastic coaches Kendall is able to fulfill her hopes and dreams at this stage in her young life. When asked if she plans to do this all again next year, her immediate response is "Yes!"

...What is that sweet, soft sound coming from the back of the van? Oh, it's Kendall; her Math book on her lap....she has fallen sound asleep. Sweet dreams Kendall, may they all come true.
