

Information About Reception of the Sacraments

The seven Sacraments of the Church were instituted by Christ to confer grace.

Sacrament of Baptism. Call the parish office to register for the parents' pre-Baptismal instruction. For adults seeking to enter the Church and be Baptized, contact our Religious Ed. Office.

Sacrament of Penance (Confession). Children in our religious education program and school are prepared for Confession at age seven, as part of First Communion preparation.

Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist. Children in our religious education program and school are prepared for First Communion at age seven. Adults seeking First Communion should contact our Religious Ed. Office

Sacrament of Confirmation. Young people in our parish are prepared for reception of Confirmation in the ninth grade (age 14). For adults seeking Confirmation contact our Religious Ed. Office.

Sacrament of Marriage. Couples planning for Marriage are to contact a parish priest or deacon one year in advance to set the wedding date and plan for pre-Cana instruction.

Sacrament of Holy Orders. If you believe you have, or someone you know has, a vocation to the Priesthood or Diaconate, please contact one of our parish priests.

Anointing of the Sick. For the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick (sometimes called "Last Rites") administered by a Priest, a person or immediate family member must make the request. Late night requests may not be able to be answered until the next day. For a visitation to the sick, or Holy Communion to the sick, contact our parish office.

PASTOR'S COLUMN

Dear Parishioners,

A bad joke about bread: Children were lined up in a school cafeteria for lunch. At the end of the counter were bread slices. The cafeteria lady placed a sign in front of the bread tray that read: "Take only one. God is watching." At a table beside the counter were several trays of chocolate chip cookies. One boy whispered to his friend, "Take all the cookies you want. God's only watching the bread."

Wonder Bread. Bread is one of the most basic staples in the diet of mankind. So ubiquitous is bread, that Jesus Christ chose that particular food to be emblematic of his spiritual nourishment of us. It is a product everyone is familiar with and which is common. We know that at the Last Supper, it was bread – no other food, just bread – that he took and used in the institution of the Eucharist (along with the wine of the meal). He told his Apostles that the bread and wine were his Body and Blood, and that they should continue to do this sacrificial offering in memory of Him (meaning once he is gone, this practice was to be continued). Thus, it is our faith, that the bread and wine offered at Mass and consecrated by the hands of the Priest, with the power of the Holy Spirit, become more than bread and wine, but become, as Christ promised, his Body and Blood (i.e., the Eucharist).

Something Old, Something New. In that same vain, the understanding of Christ being the Bread of Life that gives us nourishment in our spiritual life by our receiving Christ's Body and Blood, has a long scriptural heritage. Much of this idea was prefigured in the Old Testament, brought to reality in the New Testament, and expanded upon on several books of the New Testament.

Marathon, Man. If you're a fan of TVLand, you may be familiar with marathons, where they run multiple episodes of a specific TV series or of a specific theme back to back for hours (e.g., the ALF marathon, the Gilligan's Island Marathon, the Dukes of Hazzard marathon, etc.) Well, today St. John's Gospel, begins a marathon of sorts, though far more inspirational than any of the marathons I mentioned; a Bread of Life Marathon! Beginning this weekend, and continuing through the month of August, we will be regaled with what are sometimes called "The Bread of Life Discourses." This very Bible-scholar-ish term refers to the sections of the Gospel of St. John (in Chapter 6) that focuses our understanding Jesus Christ's real and abiding presence to us in the Holy Eucharist.

Sliced Bread. These "Bread of Life discourses" find us in a synagogue in the town of Capernaum, wherein Christ is teaching the people, and helping them to connect the dots of salvation history to bring them to understanding who He is and what God has done, is doing and will do, for them. The Bread of Life discourse is sliced up in to four Scriptural servings: This weekend (August 5th) we will hear Christ say, "I am the bread of life; whoever comes to me will never hunger, and whoever believes in me will never thirst." On August 12th, "I am the living bread that came down from heaven; whoever eats this bread will

live forever; and the bread that I will give is my flesh for the life of the world." Then on August 19th, "Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life, and I will raise him on the last day." Finally on August 26th, (St. Peter says,) "You have the words of eternal life. We have come to believe and are convinced that you are the Holy One of God."

Fleshing Out the Truth. So, for the first three weeks of the month we will hear the Lord teaching his disciples that just as God fed Moses and his people in the desert all those years ago, God will continue to feed them. However, he will not feed them in the Old Testament way, but in a new and enduring way. He says that the bread he is speaking of is his own flesh, given for the life of the world. Moreover, those who feed on it, who consume his Body and Blood, might have the gift of eternal life.

Should I Stay or Should I Go? But then in the last week of August, Christ pauses his preaching to get the reaction of those listening to him. Well, if this were a modern day focus group, the reviews would not have been good. The scripture tells us that after Christ finished his discourse, "many of his disciples returned to their former way of life and no longer accompanied him." As Jesus watched these former followers turn their backs and walk away, he turns to His Twelve Apostles as asks, "Do you also want to leave?" And Peter, speaking for the twelve, says, "Master, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life. We have come to believe and are convinced that you are the Holy One of God."

Ain't Nothing Like the Real Thing. The Apostles obviously grasped the meaning of what Christ was saying. And Peter nails it: He basically says that even if they left, there is really no where else to go, because as shocking as what Jesus said to them was, if it is the truth, it is the truth. And what is that truth relayed to us in this Bread of Life discourse? It is this: Jesus is not simply speaking metaphorically about the Sacrifice He was going to offer on the Cross, rather, He was speaking quite literally, foretelling His Real Presence in the Holy Eucharist, His Body and Blood, under the appearances of bread and wine. And some of the people listening to our Lord found this shocking, even outrageous, and thus many walked away! But St. Peter, and those who remained there and remained faithful, understood that running from the truth doesn't change the truth, it merely distances yourself from it.

And so, during these dog days of August that lie ahead, amidst the heat of summer sun, and mad dashes to stay in the air conditioning, ponder the words you hear in these Gospel readings of August. And remind yourself that Jesus, who once fed that famous crowd of 5,000 with loaves and fishes, continues today to feed us, His followers, with the Bread of Life so that we might have eternal life with Him.

SCHOOL UPDATE

There is a long standing fallacy that seems to linger about among many. There are a few that know the real truth of the matter, but many still cling to the falsehood that teachers have the summer off. Those in the profession know the real truth and rightfully take offense when such remarks are made in reference to teachers having three months of free time as opposed to others who work twelve months of the year. The truth of the matter is that teachers are held to a very high standard. They are held accountable to their immediate supervisor such as the school administrator, in many cases their department chair, their district superintendent, and the parents of the children they teach. I can attest to the fact that every single teacher at Holy Cross School takes this accountability very seriously. A healthy number their summer days are spent preparing for the upcoming year, (and for some that means traveling near and far.) This might take the form of planning new ways of presenting curriculum, preparing bulletin board materials, or participating in professional development. What I reference here is on the broadest of spectrums. These are expectations of every educator. The summer season simply represents time for the completion of these

Recently I had the pleasure of completing a week-long summer institute held at Boston University. I was accompanied by fifth grade teacher, Mrs. Kimberly Speed and Junior High Science teacher Mrs. Beth Riecks. The course was entitled Thinking and the Brain, the focus of which was the science of working memory. It was presented by Mr. Andrew C. Watson, a Harvard graduate and a classroom teacher with sixteen years of educational experience. In 2012, he formed Translate the Brain after completing his M. Ed. in Mind Brain Education at Harvard. Working with teachers, students, parents, and administrators he has been traveling the country offering insight into the latest developments and practical applications of neuroscience in today's schools and classrooms. Mrs. Riecks, Mrs. Speed and I spent the week listening to presentations on the science and development of working memory and attention in and for the students that we teach. Memory demands look different in first grade and fifth grade; and they look very different in a World Language class as opposed to a Religion class. We spent five days exploring research based concepts that will assist us in connecting them directly to the world of teaching. To give some idea as to the capacity of WM, we might ask "how much room does it have?" Or according to Watson, "how many photographs does the end table hold? The answer... is not very many."

Taking an example of a WM exercise from Mr. Watson's book, Learning Begins, I'd like to present a challenge for you, the reader as a test of your WM. No pencil and paper allowed!!

- **Step One:** Think of a 10 digit phone number that you know very well and say those digits out loud. (Go ahead and say them. No one is looking.) Pretty easy, right?
- **Step Two:** Now say those 10 digits backward. (No, really, try it) Not so easy, but...after some initial hesitation...you can probably do this step readily enough.
- Step Three: Say the digits backward again, but this time add I to
 the first digit, 2 to the second, 3 to the third, and so forth. (Don't
 give up, see if you can do this.)

The third step may seem difficult even though you began with a phone number you knew and had memorized. There was the chance to repeat it backward, and to simply add one to the digits is remedial arithmetic. However, many experience WM overload and fail to complete this memory task successfully.

What we, as educators must keep in mind is the student. The material that we as teachers present to them comes from our long term memory as we offer it to them as fresh and new material, a brand new deposit into their WM! On most days, it can mean new material from one class to another! It was a week of valuable learning for the three of us and we look forward to presenting it to our faculty.

How does one develop WM? Ahhhhh! I have the answer to that critical question! But, I leave that for another installment. Stay tuned for the next chapter of Working Memory...Let the Learning Begin!

Custom Rosary for Diocese 150th Anniversary

A custom-designed, limited-edition, dark red and gold rosary is now available to commemorate the 150th anniversary of the Catholic Diocese of Wilmington. The rosaries, made in Italy by the Ghirelli Company, were blessed at the Vatican by Pope Francis on June 6, 2018 during His Holiness' Weekly Audience in Saint Peter's Square.

The Official Custom Rosary of the Diocese of Wilmington's 150th Anniversary features a crucifix that is designed after the beautiful crucifix in the Cathedral of Saint Peter in Wilmington. The back of the crucifix is engraved with the words, "Catholic Diocese of Wilmington 150th Anniversary 1868-2018." The front of the rosary's centerpiece holds an image of the Blessed Mother from the famous Charles Parks Our Lady of Queen of Peace statue located on the grounds of Holy Spirit Church in New Castle, Delaware. On the centerpiece's reverse, is an image of Saint Francis de Sales, the Patron Saint of the Diocese of Wilmington. In place of the traditional "Our Father" beads, the rosary has a medal crest of the Diocese of Wilmington, with a map of Delaware and Maryland's Eastern Shore on the back, indicating the twelve counties that comprise the Diocese. All beads are 8 mm dark red Bohemian glass, while the chain and custom features are made of antique gold finish medal. The rosary comes in a commemorative color pouch, and is available for a suggested \$30.00 donation each, plus shipping and handling.
