

Information About Reception of the Sacraments

The seven Sacraments of the Church were instituted by Christ to confer grace.

Sacrament of Baptism. Call the parish office to register for the parents' pre-Baptismal instruction. For adults seeking to enter the Church and be Baptized, contact our Religious Ed. Office.

Sacrament of Penance (Confession). Children in our religious education program and school are prepared for Confession at age seven, as part of First Communion preparation.

Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist. Children in our religious education program and school are prepared for First Communion at age seven. Adults seeking First Communion should contact our Religious Ed. Office

Sacrament of Confirmation. Young people in our parish are prepared for reception of Confirmation in the ninth grade (age 14). For adults seeking Confirmation contact our Religious Ed. Office.

Sacrament of Marriage. Couples planning for Marriage are to contact a parish priest or deacon one year in advance to set the wedding date and plan for pre-Cana instruction.

Sacrament of Holy Orders. If you believe you have, or someone you know has, a vocation to the Priesthood or Diaconate, please contact one of our parish priests.

Anointing of the Sick. For the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick (sometimes called "Last Rites") administered by a Priest, a person or immediate family member must make the request. Late night requests may not be able to be answered until the next day. For a visitation to the sick, or Holy Communion to the sick, contact our parish office.

Dear Parishioners,

It was 1974, Bell Bottoms were in, platform shoes were the rage, the Post-It note was invented, GI Joe with Kung-Fu grip was the #1 toy, pet rocks were on their way in, and puka shells on their way out. In that same year, there was a song entitled, "The Last Game of the Season." The schmaltzy bit of pop puffery told the tale of young boy in high school who was on the football team. Evidently, he wasn't the best player. His dad, who was blind, nonetheless came to every game in which his son played during his high school year. During one game – the titular "Last Game of the Season" – many players are injured, and second string may be called in. Suddenly, the boy is called to locker room for a phone call. When he returns to players' bench, he tells the coach, "You gotta let me in to play." And play he does! He plays like never before.

Was Blind, but Now I See. The lyrics say, due to his amazing playing "It'll make the local papers / how the team came from behind / when they saw him playing' his heart to win." Big comeback for the team by the work of this second-string player. The song then explains why he play so well that evening: "And when the game was over / the coach asked him to tell / what was it he was thinking' of / that made him play so well. / "You knew my dad was blind," he said / "Tonight he passed away" / "It was the first time that my father's seen me play."

The point of the song is that blind father, who passed away, now would be able to see more and see better than before. He would see his son differently for the first time. His son was still his son, but now appeared differently, transfigured, if you would before the eyes of a blind man.

Ain't No Mountain High Enough. Today, in our Gospel, Apostles Ss. Peter, James and John, have a "Last Game of the Season" moment. At this point, they have been with Jesus for some time: they've travelled, ministered, ate, and prayed with Him. They have faithfully followed, and persevered with Him. And today on Mount Tabor, after years of seeing Jesus the man, they finally get to see Jesus in his fullness, as He truly is, in his Divinity. At the Transfiguration, the veil between the natural and supernatural realms was peeled back for just a moment, but that short glimpse of God was all that was needed! The Scripture describes the scene like this: *"Jesus took Peter, James, and John and led them up a high mountain apart by themselves. And he was transfigured before them, and his clothes became dazzling white Then a cloud came, casting a shadow over them; from the cloud came a voice, "This is my beloved Son. Listen to him.""* (Mark 9:2-3a,7)

Who Can It Be Now? This Transfiguration scene is more accurately described as a moment of Theophany. Theophany (a big ol' \$50 word) is a moment in Scripture, when the Blessed Trinity (God the Father, Son and Holy Spirit) comes forth, and is experienced by those present. Jesus Christ, God the Son in the flesh, is there, with his Apostles. The cloud that casts a shadow over the Apostles is the same one that overshadowed Mary (Luke 1:35): the glorious cloud of the Holy Spirit from which the voice God the Father's booms, "This is my beloved Son."

Wholly Moses! In this moment of Theophany, the Apostles, for the first time, see more than just Jesus, or even Jesus transfigured; they saw a glimpse of God in his fullness. Question: Who was the last person to see God in this manner? If you were on Jeopardy, you might respond: Who is Moses? And Alex Trebek would congratulate you on answering correctly. Yes, in Exodus, chapters 33-34, Moses converses directly with God on Mount Sinai. The brilliance of God's light which is seen in the Transfiguration, was seen in that encounter between Moses and God, when Moses received the Ten Commandments. For this reason, it is quite appropriate that Moses is present at the Transfiguration. His presence reminds the Apostles that what Moses saw, they have now seen.

Exact Change. In Exodus, we are told that God's brilliance was so great that, *"the skin of [Moses'] face had become radiant while he spoke with the Lord."* I don't know if the Apostle got a similar – dare I say – "Son tan" in their encounter with Christ at the Transfiguration, but I can say that they were forever changed! Christ's Transfiguration marked the Apostles transformation. They saw Christ differently, and so they left that mountainside differently than when they arrived. Their lives were changed by this encounter with the Lord.

Wait and See. What about us? Can we come to see things differently? Can we strive to see things as God would have us see them? It may take time, and perseverance, but we can come to see things differently. For instance:

- Back-in-the-day it took me awhile to learn that the Columbia House Record and Tape Club's promise of 11-lps and tapes for "free," really wasn't such a bargain (\$114.80 later, I saw things differently);
- At age 30, I could have a Big Mac or a bucket of fried chicken very late at night, and then go to bed, no problem; 25 years later, my stomach (and) I see things differently. Oy vey!

Taste and See. At Mass, when we approach the altar to receive Holy Communion, with the eyes of our head we see only bread and wine. But, by drawing closer to God as we do in Lent, we can come to see things differently. So, let us join our minds and hearts to those of the Apostles at the Transfiguration, and let us see who is really here with us. Let us approach Holy Communion and see not just the bread and wine visible to our human eyes, but rather, let us see what is really there: The Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity of Jesus Christ. Let's allow that encounter to transform us to become more and more like Christ, so that we might bare the name Christian not just proudly, but rightfully.

SCHOOL UPDATE

It was yet another occasion of many where I once again was faced with having to make a vet appointment for one of my cats. I absolutely dread these occasions for many reasons, not the least of which is trying to fit it into my schedule. This is further complicated by the fact that my vet is 40 minutes away from my home. And so it was one afternoon faced with a scheduling conflict, I was calling to make another arrangement. The veterinary practice is a busy one, so rescheduling is no easy task, aligning their schedule with mine. Finally, after having gone back and forth with options, I had a thought! With great enthusiasm, I told Jasmine, the perky receptionist that I had an early dismissal on Ash Wednesday! "Do you have anything in the afternoon on Ash Wednesday?" All of the sudden the perky Jasmine was dead silent. "Hello??" I *thought* we had lost our connection. And then in a few seconds it occurred to me that this poor soul didn't know Ash Wednesday from a stick on the ground. Then I said, "what about Valentine's Day, do you have anything on Valentine's Day in the afternoon?" Well then the lines of communication were back open and I had myself a 3 pm appointment!

We've become accustomed to that second look when appearing in public with the cross of ashes on my forehead. My colleagues and I live in a bit of a bubble; we rely upon each other for prayer and support. We share a common bond in the strength of our faith; it is much a part of who we are. It carries us through times of trial and tribulation. The world is in a constant state of trial and tribulation. Quite frankly, I cannot bring myself to listen to the commentary and incessant news reports of all that is wrong in our society. So, with a heavy sigh of exasperation, I push the button to another station. I did that on Ash Wednesday morning only to hear the local DJ's bantering back and forth as they discussed the season of Lent. Their discussion began with "Isn't this the first day of Lent?" Responding in the positive, the other DJ went on to explain that in the church she was raised in (this is a direct quote)... "we didn't really *do* Lent." Wait, did she just say "do" Lent?? Now, if I wasn't already exasperated enough by the world's broken state, now I had to listen to these two chitchat on the radio where thousands of people were listening to them downplay the significance of Lent, that for most (I hope) is an intensely penitential time set aside for us to examine our sinful natures and return to the God who we have, through our own rebelliousness and folly hurt time and time again.

Heavy sigh, I find another station....I kid you not when I recount what I heard on my third station selection of my daily morning commute. Much the same scenario; two DJ's discussing the onset of the liturgical season. The one of them thought he was being quite clever when he announced that he thought it was (another direct quote) "pretty cool that this year Lent starts on Valentine's Day and ends on April Fool's Day." Okay, that's it; this time my finger went to the off button and the remainder of my commute was spent in blissful silence.

I can assure you that in our small school community, we take our observance of Lent very seriously. We focus on the aspects of prayer, almsgiving, and fasting. We are surrounded by visual reminders of Christ's sacrifice for us. We will attend Mass every Wednesday morning and we will prepare our students for the presentation of the Stations of the Cross from the perspective of the Blessed Mother in *Mary's Way of the Cross*. Together, we will walk the road to Calvary during a presentation of *Shadow Stations* prepared by our seventh graders. Once again, this year we will visit with the residents of The Little Sisters of the Poor facility in Newark after presenting the *Living Stations*. It is one of the Lenten activities that we look forward to. The residents appreciate our students who take this opportunity so very seriously and present each station with such devotion and reverence.

During this season of Lent, I ask for continued prayers for both of our schools, HC and STMA; that our students learn the lifetime lesson that the purpose of Lent does not stop at sadness and despair - it points us to the hope of the Resurrection and the day when every tear shall be dried. (Rev. 21:3). Amen.
