

Information About Reception of the Sacraments

The seven Sacraments of the Church were instituted by Christ to confer grace.

Sacrament of Baptism. Call the parish office to register for the parents' pre-Baptismal instruction. For adults seeking to enter the Church and be Baptized, contact our Religious Ed. Office.

Sacrament of Penance (Confession). Children in our religious education program and school are prepared for Confession at age seven, as part of First Communion preparation.

Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist. Children in our religious education program and school are prepared for First Communion at age seven. Adults seeking First Communion should contact our Religious Ed. Office

Sacrament of Confirmation. Young people in our parish are prepared for reception of Confirmation in the ninth grade (age 14). For adults seeking Confirmation contact our Religious Ed. Office.

Sacrament of Marriage. Couples planning for Marriage are to contact a parish priest or deacon one year in advance to set the wedding date and plan for pre-Cana instruction.

Sacrament of Holy Orders. If you believe you have, or someone you know has, a vocation to the Priesthood or Diaconate, please contact one of our parish priests.

Anointing of the Sick. For the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick (sometimes called "Last Rites") administered by a Priest, a person or immediate family member must make the request. Late night requests may not be able to be answered until the next day. For a visitation to the sick, or Holy Communion to the sick, contact our parish office.

Dear Parishioners, English is one of the toughest, most idiomatic and most rule-evasive languages one can have to learn. In Spanish, in Italian and in Latin, the rules of pronunciation are fiercely followed and seem work most all of the time. But, English is often quite quirky. As an example, in English we have the words “through” (rhymes with boo), “tough” (fluff), “cough” (off), “bough” (ow), “though” (go), and “hiccough” (pick-up). Thus, the rule on “ough” words is that there is no rule, or the rules don’t apply. Thus, though these words are tough, if by practice we plough through them thoroughly, they don’t seem so rough. The poetic-point I’m making is that proper pronunciation can be difficult at times.

Meanwhile in the Bible. Very frequently in the reading or proclamation of scripture, a reader, in pronouncing an unfamiliar word, often tries to use contemporary English languages rules on words that are not actually from English; or are words of different era; or are words with unique pronunciations. In this column, I to present to you my seven favorite Biblical word stumblers... many of which I myself have stumbled over, trammed, or bobbed at one time or another.

1. **Elijah and Elisha.** These two prophets both appear in the Old Testament Book of Kings, and oft referenced in the same sentence and paragraph (like in 1 Kings 19:19, “Elijah set out, and came upon Elisha, son of Shaphat.” Now, just about everyone gets “Elijah” correct, but then a reader hits Elisha and we get to hear various pronunciation plays: Alicia, Eli-Shah, E-lish-a. But the truth is, it is pronounced just like Elijah, with a touch more “shh” in the middle. The names are meant to sound alike.
2. **Brazier.** This is a favorite of mine. Brazier rhymes with, to use a TV reference, “Frasier.” A brazier is a fire pot, like what we light the Easter fire in before the Easter Vigil begins. However, oft when read at Mass, like in Jeremiah 36:22, the reader will pronounce the word “brazier” like “brassiere” (as in a woman’s foundation garment). Thus, chuckles erupt, when the assembly hears, “*Now the king was sitting in his winter house, since it was the ninth month, and a fire was burning in the brazier (brassiere) before him.*” Back in the halcyon days of the 70s, many a bra may have been burned during the early days of the woman’s liberation movement, but, as God as my witness, something like that never happened in the Bible.
3. **Reconnoiter.** Unless one is prepared for this word when reading scripture, it yields the automotive equivalent of hitting a pothole. Wham! Jolt! The word reconnoiter is a military one; it means to observe a specific area and report back on what you find. Thus, in Joshua 2:1 we hear, “*Then Joshua, son of Nun, secretly sent out two spies from Shittim, saying, ‘Go, reconnoiter the land and Jericho.’*” What we oft hear read aloud to us is “reh-con-no-ter,” “re-conter,” or for the reader who wants to add a French tinge to the word, we may hear “recon-wa-teer.” Properly however, it is read as rec-on-OY-ter.
4. **Mammon.** Let’s be clear, mammon is not a French word. Its origin is Aramaic but was adopted into Greek and emerged into Middle English. Mammon is used to refer to the Devil, or earthly false gods. As for how it is pronounced, it is not a Delawarean-type sound-alike for the grandmotherly moniker, “mom mom.” Rather, put on your fishing gear, because “mammon” rhymes with “salmon” (which has no “l” sound, of course, except in the deep south). So, while you may serve butternut squash with salmon, scripture tells us: “*You cannot serve both God and mammon.*” (Luke 16:13).
5. **Bethpage.** Okay, I get this word wrong nearly every time I read it aloud. I come from New York City, and am familiar with many of the towns and suburbs located on Long Island. One of these suburban towns is call “Bethpage.” And inevitably that is what falls from my lips when I read Matthew 21:1, “*When they drew near Jerusalem and came to Bethpage on the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two disciples...*” Now of course, I know that that town Jesus is speaking doesn’t have a strip mall, a bowling alley, and twelve-plex theatre, but nonetheless, “Bethpage” comes forth from my lips. The proper pronunciation for this Biblical locale, is not “beth-page” or “beth-fage,” rather it is “Beth-fuh-zsee.” I hope to not make this faux pas again, but I fear I will get on the Long Island Expressway of language again and find myself exiting in Bethpage!
6. **Job.** At least once a year, the name Job (rhymes with robe), will be mispronounced as job (rhymes with rob, and is the most common pronunciation of these three letters). And in one of the toughest sentences from the book of Job, wherein pronouncing Job correctly is the least of one’s troubles, we read this: “*Now when three of Job’s friends heard of all the misfortune that had come upon him, they set out each one from his own place: Eliphaz from Teman, Bildad from Shuh, and Zophar from Naamath.*” The pronunciation of all those names could be the basis for a whole ’nother article. (FYI: For you football fans who read scripture, just a hint, “Naamath” is not pronounced the same way as the name of Broadway Joe).
7. **Prophecy.** This word appears during the play-formatted crucifixion scene read by the Priest, Deacon and people at Mass, in parts, on Palm Sunday. In this scripted segment of St. Mark’s Gospel, there are speaking parts for a Narrator and “the Crowd.” The narrator’s text is usually read by one of the parish deacons, and the crowd’s text is usually read by the faithful in the pews. It reads like this: Narrator: “*They blindfolded him and struck him and said to him,*” Crowd: “*Prophecy!*” This is a famous moment from the Passion of the Lord. The people call on him to prophesy (a verb, with the ending sound -sigh), but inevitably when the moment comes the crowd in the pews exclaims, “prophecy” (a noun, with the ending sound -see). Thus, annually, I can prophesy that I will hear the word prophecy during the Passion of the Lord reading; and I can equally prophesy that at least once during the following year, I will see the word “prophecy” (ending sound -sigh) and I will follow the ways of the crowd in pronouncing it “prophecy” (ending sound -see). Sigh!

SCHOOL UPDATE

It has been said that “cleaning with children around is like shoveling snow during a blizzard.” Everyone knows that over the summer I miss the children something terrible!! But we do take advantage of the emptiness of the buildings to clean, shift things around a bit, install, replenish, renew, replace, and renovate.....just plain make ready for the new school year. I thought everyone might be interested in a few of the things we’ve accomplished over the past several weeks.

We have shifted things around a bit so that....

- We have a new space dedicated solely for the Robotics classes. Due to the overwhelming interest in the class, and the number of students who Mrs. Williams will have in the classroom we have re-purposed the elementary computer lab on the second floor. All the kits have been taken across the parking lot and sit waiting ready for use. There is more than ample floor space for those who like to get right down to it, and the beautiful black tables on which we previously had placed the PC’s in the lab are now being used as work space for their “builds.” A big thank you to Father Lentini for purchasing three new computers to handle the software the young engineers will have to access in the process of creating their build. Mrs. Williams and I are excited about this newly purposed space and I am pretty sure the students will be, too!
- We have a new space dedicated to the students and Mrs. Zink who will be teaching the Publication Design class. This room is also on the second floor of the elementary building, it formerly housed the Title One program. Thanks to Mrs. Zink and her elbow grease, this room is being transformed into an old fashioned newsroom! The students who selected Publication Design will be responsible for producing the HC Yearbook and The Crusader magazine. Our debut edition of The Crusader magazine was published last year in commemoration of our 65th anniversary. So very popularly received, this publication will serve as an annual report and our “news staff” will play a huge role in that endeavor. Mrs. Zink plans to introduce her news staff to new software provided by Life Touch as well as other websites used for the creation of journals, periodicals, and magazines.
- We have a fabulously fantastic newly designed space for our newest and youngest Crusaders. I tell you....you simply MUST SEE this expansive, thoughtfully planned learning space. The tree is gorgeous!!

We’ve replaced and renovated.....

We’re also grateful to the HSA for committing the necessary funding to this upgrade in our school security. The capital raised through their fundraising endeavors comes from our parent community.
