

Information About Reception of the Sacraments

The seven Sacraments of the Church were instituted by Christ to confer grace.

Sacrament of Baptism. Call the parish office to register for the parents' pre-Baptismal instruction. For adults seeking to enter the Church and be Baptized, contact our Religious Ed. Office.

Sacrament of Penance (Confession). Children in our religious education program and school are prepared for Confession at age seven, as part of First Communion preparation.

Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist. Children in our religious education program and school are prepared for First Communion at age seven. Adults seeking First Communion should contact our Religious Ed. Office

Sacrament of Confirmation. Young people in our parish are prepared for reception of Confirmation in the ninth grade (age 14). For adults seeking Confirmation contact our Religious Ed. Office.

Sacrament of Marriage. Couples planning for Marriage are to contact a parish priest or deacon one year in advance to set the wedding date and plan for pre-Cana instruction.

Sacrament of Holy Orders. If you believe you have, or someone you know has, a vocation to the Priesthood or Diaconate, please contact one of our parish priests.

Anointing of the Sick. For the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick (sometimes called "Last Rites") administered by a Priest, a person or immediate family member must make the request. Late night requests may not be able to be answered until the next day. For a visitation to the sick, or Holy Communion to the sick, contact our parish office.

Dear Parishioners,

Well, central Delaware and the Eastern Shore of Maryland experienced their first snow storm of the New Year this past weekend. It was not a monumental snowstorm, but it was enough to close our Parish schools and all area schools for the day. And so, now, with the depletion of bread, milk, and toilet paper from our supermarkets, with roads covered with more salt than a Philadelphia pretzel, and with people singing “Baby, It’s Cold Outside” (while dodging the political-correctness police), we know that winter is really and truly here. December gave us some mild days, but, dang, January means business!

Many people will lament that snow can be annoying and inconveniencing, yet, at the same time, it is also beautiful. It is also worth noting that the Scriptures are not silent on the issue of snow. The Bible has a blizzard of references to that white stuff. So, while the weather outside is frightful, the Scriptures are so delightful (and insightful). And so, here are a flurry of scripture texts regarding snow and some of my, I hope not too flakey, thoughts about them:

In Daniel (3:67-70), the Prophet tells us about three young men (Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego) being cast into a fiery furnace by Nebuchadnezzar, king of Babylon, for refusing to bow down to the king’s image. While these three young men are baking in the heat of the furnace, they praise God saying, *“Cold and chill, bless the Lord; praise and exalt him above all forever... Frost and chill, bless the Lord; praise and exalt him above all forever. Ice and snow bless the Lord; praise and exalt him above all forever.”* The young men were spared death in the furnace by the power of God. So, while you may not like ice and snow, this scripture reminds us that its beauty and presence serve to bless the Lord. I imagine that as some of you find yourself slipping on ice and driving on snowy roads this winter, you may also be having a conversation with God on this matter, but it might not be words of blessing. If that’s the case, think of the three young men in the furnace, and warm up to words of praise instead.

The Book of Proverbs (25:10) informs us that *“Like the coolness of snow in the heat of the harvest is a faithful messenger for the one who sends him. He refreshes the soul of his master.”* From the “holy-Hannah-it’s-freezing” cold of last Monday night and Tuesday, and the several inches of white stuff we have all learned about “coolness” – and not in the 1970s Fonzie sense of the world. But despite the cold and the snow we carry on, we continue! The weather does its thing, and we do ours. In the midst of the coldest winter, our hearts burn with the love of God – giving us, dare I say, “Happy Days” even in the midst of rough weather.

From the Book of the long-suffering Job (5:5-7, in part) we hear, *“He does great things beyond our knowing; wonders past our searching out. For he says to the snow, ‘fall to the earth’... He shuts up all mankind indoors.”* Teachers and students take note: this passage shows the Divine origin of

snow days: God makes it snow (“He says to the snow, ‘fall to the earth’”), kids can’t go to school (“he shuts up all mankind indoors”). So, when you see those “School Closed” listings on WBOC, God gives us those times – those oft unexpected times – for us to be able to spend time with our families or just a quiet day inside.

In a similar vein, the book of Proverbs 31:10,21 advises us that, *“When one finds a worthy wife, her value is far beyond pearls. She fears not the snow for her household; all her charges are doubly clothed.”* To all you husbands with wives who are moms of school-aged kids, here’s a scripture that puts all those psycho-crazy snowy mornings into perspective. That worthy wife “fears not the snow” she deals with it, firmly and directly!

The Book of Wisdom (16:22), in its sagaciousness, notes, *“Yet snow and ice withstood fire and were not melted, that they might know that their enemies’ fruits were consumed by a fire that blazed in the hail and flashed lightning in the rain.”* Each year, I find streets in Dover, and roads out near Marydel that this passage brings to mind. You know the roads I’m talking about. Everywhere else the snow and ice are gone, and yet, you turn down that one street, and find that you are in the land that time forgot! It looks like the ice age hit there, and the snow and the ice abide! The point of the story: The gifts of God are indestructible against the forces that infernal, Devilish enemy. He gives us the ability to prevail by his grace!

Finally, in the First Book of Maccabees (13:21-22), *“The men in the citadel sent messengers to Trypho, urging him to come to them by way of the desert, and to send them provisions. Although Trypho got all his cavalry ready to go, there was a heavy fall of snow that night, and he could not go. So, he left for Gilead.”* Those poor guys in the citadel! Even with the efforts of Trypho, they were not able to get their bread and milk (and toilet paper)! They didn’t stop at the Redners beforehand, and thus they weren’t prepared. So, next time the sky is a “Hazy shade of winter,” (kudos to Simon and Garfunkel), and 1/8 of an inch of snow is predicted, and you see the crazy shopping line at Redners, consider that maybe those people read this passage of scripture and are playing it safe.

As I write this column on Tuesday afternoon, January 15, the weather report for the coming weekend looks snowy and (in the words of rock band Foreigner) “Cold as Ice.” If this is correct, and the snow starts falling like World Series ratings when there’s no east coast team involved, then it might just be a good time to ponder these scriptures, which are both timeless and timely. It might be a good time to recall God’s hand in the very beauty of creation, and in our daily lives. Let it snow, let it snow, let it snow! (And if it doesn’t snow, blame the Weather Channel, but praise God anyway!)

SCHOOL INFORMATION

To have served Holy Cross School and Parish over the past thirty years has been one of the two greatest blessings of my entire life. In my time, I can attest to some days being better than others. I remember one of those better days very clearly. I entered the elementary office several weeks ago and Mrs. Stant relayed some information regarding a phone conversation with a lady who had told the story of the sale of her home and recent move to Delaware. As a lifelong Catholic and product of Catholic education, she was interested in talking to me about the possibility of making a donation to our school. My interest was immediately peaked, but with everything else happening right before the onset of the Christmas holiday break, I contented myself with waiting until she and I would have the chance to meet.

I also have a clear recollection of the evening of the ELC musical when I was approached by an alumni parent who asked me if he could arrange for us to meet sometime soon. "All I need is two minutes of your time." I responded by saying that I had two minutes right then and there, if he would like to take advantage of the opportunity. He went on to tell me that his financial circumstances permitted him to make a monetary donation to our school and all he wanted me to do was think about how it might be used to its greatest benefit. Thanking him profusely, I promised him I would give it serious thought and contact him when I had determined the best use of his donation.

I began the Christmas vacation secure in the knowledge that there were two kind and generous people out there who clearly valued the Catholic education of their childhood days and as successful adults were willing to share and give back as demonstration of their gratitude.

So the Christmas holiday came and went, and the day arrived when I was to meet with the lady who had sold her home and wanted to discuss her donation. Meeting her was indeed a pleasure. She told me about her deep devotion to St. Joseph and St. Therese, and how she sought their intervention in selling her childhood home in Pennsylvania. It was a beautiful story as it unfolded. I asked her if she would mind if we used her funds towards defraying the cost of the purchase of a new Reading series for our primary grades. "I would be ecstatic" was her response. The only stipulation in giving to our school was that her anonymity be maintained. I gave her my promise. She then picked up her pen and wrote a check made payable to Holy Cross School for \$10,000.

Still reeling from our good fortune, I was in the office when our alumni parent walked through the door and handed me a sealed envelope. As I received the envelope, I invited him back to my office. Inside the envelope was a check made payable to Holy Cross School in the amount of \$2500.00. These funds were also earmarked for the purchase of Reading books. In just one day our school had been blessed by two very magnanimous donations! That will never happen again...or maybe it might!

It is with humble gratitude that I relay the story of great fortune (no pun intended) to you, our reader.

It is to you, our reader that I make mention of a day during Catholic Schools Week set aside by the National Catholic Educators Association known as *Many Gifts, One Nation: A Day of Giving to Catholic Schools*. It will occur on January 29-30, 2019, 12 PM EST - 12 PM EST. Would you reflect on joining our two benefactors in making a donation to our parish school? There are in excess of 400 reasons for your consideration. May God continue to bless those who realize the true value and lifelong impact of a Catholic education.
