

Information About Reception of the Sacraments

The seven Sacraments of the Church were instituted by Christ to confer grace.

Sacrament of Baptism. Call the parish office to register for the parents' pre-Baptismal instruction. For adults seeking to enter the Church and be Baptized, contact our Religious Ed. Office.

Sacrament of Penance (Confession). Children in our religious education program and school are prepared for Confession at age seven, as part of First Communion preparation.

Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist. Children in our religious education program and school are prepared for First Communion at age seven. Adults seeking First Communion should contact our Religious Ed. Office

Sacrament of Confirmation. Young people in our parish are prepared for reception of Confirmation in the ninth grade (age 14). For adults seeking Confirmation contact our Religious Ed. Office.

Sacrament of Marriage. Couples planning for Marriage are to contact a parish priest or deacon one year in advance to set the wedding date and plan for pre-Cana instruction.

Sacrament of Holy Orders. If you believe you have, or someone you know has, a vocation to the Priesthood or Diaconate, please contact one of our parish priests.

Anointing of the Sick. For the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick (sometimes called "Last Rites") administered by a Priest, a person or immediate family member must make the request. Late night requests may not be able to be answered until the next day. For a visitation to the sick, or Holy Communion to the sick, contact our parish office.

Dear Parishioners,

Judge Dred. In 1857 the Supreme Court of the United States in the Dred Scott Decision ruled that Dred Scott, a black man, and former slave could not bring action in court for his freedom, as he was not a person, but personal property of his master. In this decision Chief Justice Taney, referring to the language in the Declaration of Independence that said, “all men are created equal” said that the phrase “all men” did not refer to blacks, slave or free. Chief Justice Taney reasoned that “it is too clear for dispute, that the enslaved African race were not intended to be included and formed no part of the people[.]” This ruling held until the conclusion of the Civil War and the passage of the 13th Amendment.

Oh, Canada! In 1928 the Supreme Court of Canada was posed a question about personhood. The British North America Act which until 1980 or so was the law of Canada, said that persons can be named to the Canadian Senate by a specific procedure. The question asked was "Does the word "persons" in Section 24, of The British North America Act, 1867, include “female persons?” The court replied, ‘no,’ and held that women were not ‘persons’ and were thus not entitled to hold office as Senators in Canada. This ruling held until the British Privy Council overruled it a year later.

New York, New York. On January 24, 2019, the Governor of New York, Andrew Cuomo, signed a new state law that not only codified the heinous Roe v. Wade abortion decision into state law... but then expanded on it. Let me note some of the key provisions and implications of the laws:

- Under the law (ironically titled, The Reproductive Health Act), doctors are now allowed to perform abortions up and through all three trimesters of a pregnancy (this is not a misprint). To make this worse, and more shocking, the law also allows non-doctors to do likewise.
- The law provides no presence of “born alive” protections. What does that mean? Well, in New York (up until this law) as in most states, if a baby is born alive during a botched abortion, that child’s life has an affirmative right to be protected. Under the new law, those protections are repealed; thus, a child born alive can now be allowed to simply die.
- If the child in the womb, if killed in a crime, can no longer be counted as a victim of homicide, whereas previously they could have been. The new law excludes unborn children from the definition of “human person.” So, basically, all protections for the child are removed. [Let me add this: In New York, it is a crime to abandon an animal and leave it to die (and that penalty is about to be increased in legislation that passed the State Senate earlier this year). So, your pet dog Fido has greater protection than a human child in the Empire State.]
- There is much more that could be written on the specifics of the laws, but space constrains me. In short: This is a terrible law, a hateful law – and its intention is clear: to allow abortion anytime for any reason.

Celebration? If the aborting of a child or an increasing number of abortions something to celebrate? Well, evidently, Governor Andrew Cuomo thinks so. When this “Reproductive Health Act” was signed into law by Governor Cuomo, he deemed it celebratory. He ordered One World Trade Center and other New York sites to be lit up in pink so as to celebrate the passage of the expansive abortion law. In New York – a State where over one in four (28%) pregnancies end in abortion – it is astounding that having a new law that allows the snuffing out of even more lives by abortion is considered by anyone as something to be celebrated. How sick. How abjectly, totally, demented. Likewise, as the bill passed in the New York State Senate, it received a standing ovation and applause. Usually one applauds an accomplishment, not the diminishment of humanity.

A Tough Week. It was an especially sickening week, in New York, for human life. It was especially disturbing week for the faithful to witness the temptation of the Prince of Lies convincing people that they determine who is and isn’t deserving of life. When mankind, and when political leaders, get into the business of determining who a human person, things go very badly. Look at our nation’s Dred Scott Decision (1857) and the Canada’s Person Case (1928), to see the ramification of humanity’s hubris at play, when playing the role of the maker, and shunning the role of protector.

Rev. Martin Luther King, whose birthday was observed in January, famously wrote in his letter from a Birmingham Jail, “We should never forget that everything Adolf Hitler did in Germany was ‘legal’” Indeed we should never forget that. We should not forget that when a child is killed in utero in the ninth month of a pregnancy in New York in the coming months or is born-alive-but-left-to-die, those things are now legal in New York, but morally reprobate and contrary to natural law and God’s law. But, alas, this is what happens when people forget the importance of the presence of teachings of Jesus Christ in the public square and in the halls of power. Or as more clearly put by Alexander Solzhenitsyn, critic of atheistic communism, and survivor of Soviet gulags, when I identifying some of the terrible actions of humanity, “If I were called upon to identify briefly the principal trait of the entire twentieth century, here too, I would be unable to find anything more precise and pithy than to repeat once again: Men have forgotten God.”

Of Sin and Sinatra. I am reminded of a passage from the 17th Chapter of the Second Book of Kings (2 Kings 17:9a, 11b-12): “They adopted unlawful practices toward the LORD, their God... They did evil things that provoked the LORD, and served idols, although the LORD had told them: You must not do this.” But I buoyed by the hope that there is always redemption, and possibility of changes of heart. And it is my prayer that that happens in this matter. But to quote Frank Sinatra: “It’s up to you, New York, New York.”
