

Information About Reception of the Sacraments

The seven Sacraments of the Church were instituted by Christ to confer grace.

Sacrament of Baptism. Call the parish office to register for the parents' pre-Baptismal instruction. For adults seeking to enter the Church and be Baptized, contact our Religious Ed. Office.

Sacrament of Penance (Confession). Children in our religious education program and school are prepared for Confession at age seven, as part of First Communion preparation.

Sacrament of the Holy Eucharist. Children in our religious education program and school are prepared for First Communion at age seven. Adults seeking First Communion should contact our Religious Ed. Office

Sacrament of Confirmation. Young people in our parish are prepared for reception of Confirmation in the ninth grade (age 14). For adults seeking Confirmation contact our Religious Ed. Office.

Sacrament of Marriage. Couples planning for Marriage are to contact a parish priest or deacon one year in advance to set the wedding date and plan for pre-Cana instruction.

Sacrament of Holy Orders. If you believe you have, or someone you know has, a vocation to the Priesthood or Diaconate, please contact one of our parish priests.

Anointing of the Sick. For the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick (sometimes called "Last Rites") administered by a Priest, a person or immediate family member must make the request. Late night requests may not be able to be answered until the next day. For a visitation to the sick, or Holy Communion to the sick, contact our parish office.

Dear Parishioners,

From time to time, I'm approached by Parishioners or other members of the faithful, who want my "take" or my feedback on Catholic matters. Often these matters deal with some prognostication of some Catholic "visionary" or some secret revelation from a saint or from God himself. Often these "visions" or revelations are not confirmed by the authority of the Church, and in some cases are not approved at all. The problem I have with many of these matters when they are presented to me, is that they are presented as a "you must believe this" or else.

Do You Want to Know a Secret? The problem with that is that the way some of this material or information is presented is as secret knowledge or special knowledge, beyond the Catechism, the Canons, the Scriptures and Sacred Tradition. Let me be blunt: The Catholic Church is not some fringe cult, there is no secret information or knowledge that is necessary for Salvation. Everything God wanted known for mankind's salvation was revealed in Scripture, Tradition and, most fully, in the person of Jesus Christ. To hold that there is secret knowledge or special secret information necessary for salvation or knowledge of God, is called Gnosticism. Gnosticism, which is a broad category of several types of heresies, is condemned by the Church.

But there are legitimate revelations and visions that have appeared over the centuries. What about those? Where do they fit in? In this, I am referring to matters like the appearance or vision of Jesus bearing his Sacred Heart to St. Margaret Mary Alacoque or to the apparition of Mary to St. Bernadette at Lourdes. Now, in truth, both of these are called "Private Revelations" which were put forth to specific persons, for specific reasons. The Church has deemed them worthy of belief, however, neither apparition or vision is necessary to be believed for Salvation. And the problem becomes when ones devotion to a specific apparition or vision rises to the level where they impose on others that they must believe this, or else they are rejecting God, or else they are rejecting the Church, etc.

What I mean to say is: (1) the belief that Jesus Christ was the Son of God, was conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit, was incarnate of the Virgin Mary and became man, and (2) the belief that St. Joseph of Cupertino could levitate (which I firmly believe), are not on equal footing. The former is essential Catholic belief, and of salvific worth, the latter — true or not, worthy of belief or not — is not of salvific worth.

To clarify the Church's distinctions between public and private revelation, I am going to focus this week and next week's Pastor column on this topic. And away we go...

Rarities. I'm a Beatles fan. And as a fan, I ran off to my local record store in 1980 and plunked down \$7.99 for an album called "Beatles Rarities." To read the hype surrounding this album one would have thought this was the biggest thing since... well... the Beatles. The album was a collection of "rare" alternate takes of hit Beatles songs. I don't know what I really expected, but what I got were things like this: "Love Me Do" without a tambourine in the background, "Help" in mono

instead of stereo, and "Penny Lane" with a three-second trumpet solo tack on the end of the song. This Capitol Record collection of so-called "Rarities" didn't fulfill me in the same manner of great original Beatles hits, but I would have to say that it did give me a better developed appreciation of their work. While this album provided no new revelations to me about the musical talent of this legendary band, it did give me a nuanced insight to their work. There is correlation between this record buying moment from yesteryear (dare I say, "Yesterday"), and the Church's understanding of what is called "Public Revelation" and "Private Revelation" (or I might put, the fullness of the Beatles vs. "Beatles Rarities.")

You Say You Want a Revelation... The Catholic Church teaches that everything that God wished to reveal for us in order that we would be able to attain salvation was revealed in its fullness in the person of Jesus Christ. Jesus – the Word made flesh, God-incarnate – communicated the Word and the truth of God in the form of Revelation to His Apostles. The Apostles in turn either wrote it down (New Testament in conjunction with earlier scripture, all divinely inspired) or handed it on (tradition). This communication relayed to us from God, through the Apostles, is known as "Public Revelation." It is a message made known for all mankind; thus it is "public." That Divine truth in Public Revelation is what the Church calls "the Deposit of the Faith" – it is the static, immutable truth of God made known to us in scripture and tradition.

Going Public. So, what is so special about this Public Revelation? Well, for salvation (and I would expect that everyone is on board for that) what God has made known to us via Scripture and Tradition (Public Revelation), Catholics are obliged to believe, to the extent of which is known by the teaching of the Church. That is to say, these things are necessary for salvation.

Being School — Public vs. Private. This brings us to the issue of what is called Private Revelation. To what does that refer? Well, God continues to reveal himself to us and others in many ways – and many folks have had that experience and tell others about it. Because God has told us everything we need to know for salvation in the person of Christ, expressed in Public Revelation, the question may occur as to what the value, weight or, indeed, the point of any of this Private Revelation might be. The answer in short form is this: Nothing that is made known via Private Revelation is or can be necessary for salvation – it is private in its nature, even if made public by its disclosure.

So, what are conditions and examples of Private Revelation? I'll tell you in seven days because I'm out of space.

As they used to say on TV's *Batman*: To be continued next week, same bat-time, same bat-channel!

SCHOOL INFORMATION

It's been sometime back, but I remember being slightly amused by a campaign sponsored by the Delaware State Police in their attempt to control the speed and reckless abandon with which motorists operate their vehicles on the highways and byways of the nation's first state. For those who zoom by the message boards on the side of the road admonishing drivers, the intent, meaning and subtle humor was lost entirely. The irony of it all is striking. But anyway; the bold lettering on the message board read thusly: *THIS IS NOT THE DOVER INTERNATIONAL SPEEDWAY AND YOU ARE NOT DALE EARNHARDT, JR. DRIVE THE SPEED LIMIT!* For the majority of us who try to obey traffic laws, quite honestly, a daily commute can become quite dicey.

And so it has become, not exactly the Dover Speedway, but the school parking lot on any given morning has become quite dicey. I'm sure I don't have to remind everyone of the drama surrounding the crossing guard issue a couple of years ago which ultimately led to a diminished supervision of the traffic flow on the exiting driveway. It is not safe to allow your children to exit the vehicle on the driver's side of the car; there is traffic passing on that side of the driveway, and the drivers are in a dead heat to get to work. Even the poor squirrels have fallen victim to the driver who is moving too quickly to stop or slow down to avoid the poor creature and its frantic, futile attempts to avoid the loss of its very life.

I was visited by the older sibling of one of our students who came in early one morning during our drop-off time with a genuine concern for the safety, or seemingly lack thereof on our parking lot during this busy time of day. She voiced her worry over some of the careless driving habits that put the safety of the pedestrian on the back burner of the stove as parents cast aside all common sense to get back out on State Street and get their day underway now that their child is safely deposited in the school building. Not everyone has Bluetooth accessibility in their automobile, this leads to phone usage as moms and dads are driving *on the parking lot*. The state has the "Hands Free" law for a reason, and I'm pretty sure it applies to parking lots as well. If I'm wrong about that, then, it should! The ability to multi-task is a great thing---but it's not necessarily so when one of the tasks is driving a car. Drivers who open their car doors when the vehicle in the next space is moving is a clear threat to the child exiting the vehicle and who is also in a hurry. Mrs. Williams is in front of the JH Building every morning no matter the weather trying to control and maintain a safe flow of traffic. Unfortunately, and sadly enough we have parents who have tossed some not so nice verbal affronts out the window as they pass her by prior to their swinging 'round the corner onto the exit drive on two wheels. I have already alluded to the fact that we all have jobs, and we all have to get there---but parking in the fire lane to get closer to the building is a definite no-no! Follow the rules.
